Principal Update

I could not be prouder of our Lardner and District Learning Community. Since our last newsletter, students have engaged is a vast range of extracurricular activities. Our focus on learning has ensured that learning programs remain operational, strong and effective during staff absences and students have shown resilience in accepting this. Our Year 5/6 school leaders have been working hard to promote, model and acknowledge the school values through their leadership roles and responsibility. Teachers have been able to assess and work individually with students as they prepare actuate and timely semester report feedback and information. The school has also completed our Occupational Health and Safety (OH&S) external audit and successfully passed the first stage of the Child Safety Standards review (second stage scheduled for term 3).

Capital Building Works

Maintaining school buildings and grounds is an important area for all principals to ensure. Working with School Council, Business Manager (Heather Roberts) and staff, the following projects have been approved and scheduled for completion.

- Painting upgrades to the external wall of the Red Room
- Painting of the game boards in front of the admin building asphalt
- Painting of the deck rails
- Painting touch-ups around the school as required.
- Oiling of the deck including the doorways
- Ramp into the main building will be repaired and the rail for the ramp to the deck area will be adjusted to meet standard.
- Building of the Indigenous Garden and Yarning Circle

Whilst grants have not been successful in replacing the basketball court, I will be looking for further grants to apply for whilst sourcing quotes to have this area renewed within the current school budget. Our School, Our students, Our community matter.

In the Classrooms

Blue Room

We have been busy in Blue Room over the past month. In Maths we have been learning about 'time'. We have made paper plate clocks to help us make and read times on an analogue clock. We enjoyed telling the time on Tic Toc biscuits and completed a worksheet based around the time featured on our biscuit.










In Integrated Studies we have enjoyed watching our grass heads grow, each week recording the growth and any observations made. We especially enjoyed cutting and/or styling our grass hair before taking them home. We are now working on designing and creating a shoebox diorama for an animal of our choice. Making sure to include the 5 essential elements for animal survival (water, air, food, shelter and space.)













This week we began writing procedural texts. Blue room students were able to teach Ivy about *fairy bread*. The students each had to write the instructions for How to Make Fairy Bread and then had to follow these exactly to check if the order and procedure was correct. The highlight was obviously getting to enjoy eating this at the end. Ivy was especially impressed and was going to introduce her own children to this treat over the weekend.









Performing Arts

This Term we are learning about Music and how it can enrich and influence our lives in so many unique ways. Each week we play *Spicks & Specks to* enable us to discuss various musical styles, artists, instruments and origins. We have had some amazing parent volunteers, who have shared their instruments with us including the drums, electric and bass guitars, acoustic guitars, a banjo and even the cello and flute!

Students have learnt how they can create their own music using patterns, textures and different sounds. We have used buckets, pots and pans to form our own Kitchen Percussion bands. In the last few weeks, we will learn about Beatboxing and devise our own performances.

It has been wonderful to see so many students bring in their own musical instruments from home to help us learn. Thank you again to all our wonderful parents who have inspired us with their instruments and musical experiences!

















Red Room

Over the past four weeks Red Room have been focusing on connecting their prior knowledge with new and unfamiliar concepts. When the challenge to be the first to unlock the prize box was set, heads came together to review literacy learning. Conversations were full of the language we'd been using throughout our literacy sessions. Archie, Sienna & Hartley were the victors who got to enjoy a sweet treat and some free time.



As we've continued exploring changes in our earth over time, we've had more opportunities to get hands on. This time looking at how erosion changes the landscape and how powerful water can be in this process. A simple sandcastle with some randomly placed rocks had us talking about different types of rock, erosion of the land and underwater hazards created by obstacles and currents.







Storm Boy has given us a chance to see how authors use vivid language to spark the reader's imagination and interest without directly telling us their ideas. We have made inferences about the relationships between the characters and can visualise the scenes being set. In our writing we have tried using "Show it, Don't tell it." to create interesting descriptions.

Instead of 'It was a cold and rainy day' (tell it) we came up with:

As I walked outside I could see my own breath as I talked. I would need to buy more blankets and Winter clothes and the ground was drenched in water.

We couldn't go outside today. Mum said "Why on earth would you want to go outside? You can't even see 1metre in front of you." But I love dancing in the rain.

We shivered even with our scarves and beanies. Water flooded through the drains as we pulled the hoods of our raincoats over our head.

Maths

While learning about the concepts of area and perimeter we have been working on some real life problems.

The Greedy Farmer Challenge: Create a paddock that covers the largest area with a perimeter of 60m.

The greedy farmer wants the biggest area to grow his crops but only has 60m of fencing for his paddock. What size/shape should his paddock be?

Standing Room Only Challenge: How many people could safely and comfortably stand in Red Room?

Event organisers often have a 'Standing Room Only' section to maximise their ticket sales. How might they figure out how many people they could fit into the 'Standing Room Only' section of their venues.

Indonesian

This semester in Indonesian classes, we have been revising greetings, numbers and colours. We have also been learning vocabulary for face parts and weather. Our focus for Term One was describing face parts. Yellow Room students cut and paste Indonesian words to label a face picture. They also participated in games and songs to practise the words. The older grades listened to descriptions of silly faces and drew a matching picture, showing the number and colour of face parts. They then wrote Indonesian sentences about the faces.

This term we have been learning about weather words. Yellow and Blue Room students have played matching games with word and picture cards. They have also been experimenting with word cards to make sentences about the type of weather they like. Purple and Red Room students have tried recording weather and temperature from verbal weather reports and writing sentences from weather tables. Students from all classrooms have enjoyed opportunities to play the "Congklak" Indonesian strategy game!


Yellow Room
